## COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course is likely quite different from others you may have taken in Criminology and Criminal Justice. We're going to talk about a topic you have direct experiences with - going to school. Rather than focusing on facts and figures, though, this course will equip you with a lens through which you can understand the American schooling experience in a new and different way.

We will wrestle with questions that don't have precise answers: Are schools safe places? Should police be in schools? How should we respond to students' behavior problems?

We will investigate the importance of structures and systems and how they shape individuals' experiences with schools, crime, and justice.

We will consider issues of equity, and consider how our policies may provide advantages for some individuals while marginalizing others.

We will engage scientific writing while interrogating our own experiences to change the way we think about the relationship between criminal justice and the American education system.


As your instructor during this semester, I am committed to being compassionate, understanding, and flexible. Your education should not come at the expense of your personal well-being. As such, although the course will be structured around a series of deadlines for readings and assignments, I am willing to offer extensions as needed, so long as you communicate with me proactively. I ask that any requests for extensions be made <u>at</u> <u>least 24 hours before</u> an assignment is due. As committed students, I trust that you will do your best to learn this semester. As a professor committed to fostering learning, I will do my best to facilitate your success.

Following the guidance of the university, I will also ask for your cooperation with a few guidelines to ensure the health and safety of yourself and your classmates:

## ONLINE PROCTORING THROUGH HONORLOCK
