### STATISTICS IN CRIMINOLOGY

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# **Course Description**

This course will introduce you to the fundamentals of statistics in criminology, criminal justice, and social science more generally. My overarching goal is to give you an introductory knowledge of common social science statistics that will help you in your career as a practitioner, researcher, or academic. My secondary goal is to expose you to a software program that will enable you to create figures and produce results like those you might encounter in your professional life. Connecting abstract statistical concepts with real data will reinforce the material and illustrate its real life applications.

Upon successfully completing this course, you will know and be able to do the following:

- Common measures of association in criminal justice research
- How to recognize variables' levels of measurement and choose appropriate measures of association
- How to judge the strength of associations
- The purpose of significance testing and how to interpret significance tests
- The basics of interpreting output from statistical software
- How to create charts and conduct basic statistical analyses in a statistical software program

### **Course Materials**

You will need internet access and access to a computer. You will also need a basic calculator.

All of the software that you will need is available on FSU's Virtual Lab (myfsuvlab.its.fsu.edu).

## **Course Requirements**

Due dates and times are in Eastern Time.

Quizzes. You will complete seven multiple choice quizzes, one about this syllabus and six about the readings and slides. They will be evenly spaced throughout the course. They also (unless otherwise noted) will be only on that week's material, but please note that the material is somewhat cumulative (i.e., terms and concepts will repeat across chapters) so it may be difficult to understand later material without completing earlier material. The quizzes are not timed, but they must be completed and submitted by their due dates and times.

**Essays.** You will write three essays, each approximately 2 double-spaced pages in length unless otherwise noted. These essays are your chance to show off your understanding of the research methods behind the statistics we are learning. Don't just repeat the course material; instead, put it in your own words and elaborate on it to show us that you understand it. These essays should use scholarly language and should include references to specific pages in the readings or slides where that would be helpful. If you use outside sources, please also include a reference list.

# Essay grades will be based on:

- Evidence: Does the essay incorporate the course material? Show us that you completed and understood the readings and slides. We should be able to tell that you've kept up with the course to date. This can be demonstrated by mentioning and defining/explaining relevant terms and concepts, by including in-text citations for information you got from the book and slides, and so on. We discourage lengthy quotations, but if you include quotes please also explain what they mean in your own words so that we can evaluate your understanding. 2.5 points.
- Insight: Is this a well-thought-out essay that demonstrates your understanding? Show us that you are using the readings and slides to deepen your understanding of quantitative methods. This can be demonstrated by paraphrasing, giving examples, relating a topic to some other topic from the course, and so on. 2.5 points.

**Discussion Board Post**. You will complete one graded discussion board assignment in this course. This will be a 200-300 word post on either (1) a question you have about any topic we've covered or (2) a tip you have about understanding some topic we've covered. In grading these, we will assess things such as your familiarity with the material and how much effort you appear to have put into understanding your chosen topic. You can complete this post at any time during the semester.

**Projects**. I will post five project assignments in this course, and you must complete three of them. You will complete these projects using a statistical software program called Stata. These projects are your chance to generate tables and graphs like those you might encounter in a criminal justice-related position. You are probably unfamiliar with Stata, and there will be a

learning curve. We will provide tutorials, but please account for the time it will take to work with the software when you plan your schedule.

Project grades will be based on:

- Execution: Take care when using the software and completing the analyses. Were the data uploaded properly? Were the correct commands used? We will be able to tell by examining your results, writeup and output. 9 points.
- Interpretation: Does your write-up demonstrate that you understand what you did and what the results mean? This can be demonstrated through correct explanations of the analyses and results and by the inclusion of information from the book and slides. 6 points.

Why did I lose points on my assignment? If you'd like more detailed feedback on your grade, please contact your grader.

I got stuck at work/my car broke down/my loved one is ill and I missed the assignment deadline. What do I do? You get one free extension in the course. To use it, simply email the TA to let them know that you will be turning your assignment in late. You will be given a one week extension on that assignment (exceptions are assignments due during the last week of classes or finals week). After you use this freebie, to gain extensions on additional assignments, you will need documentation that those absences were excused under the policy described above.

To determine how many more points you must earn to achieve a target final grade, look at the grading scale to see how many points you must earn to make that grade, and then subtract your total points earned from that number. If the result is less than the number of points remaining, then yes, you can still earn that grade!

If I complete more than three projects, will you keep my highest grades? Please complete only three of the five project options. We will grade only the first three assignments that you submit.

Can I complete an extra credit assignment to boost my grade? Sorry, but there is no extra credit in this course. Your best bets for maximizing your grade are having the book and your notes open while you take the quizzes, ensuring that you have fully and thoroughly answered the assignment questions, contacting us early to ask any questions that you have about the assignments, and sending us drafts of your essays and projects by the deadline mentioned above.
