# **Course Description**

This course will provide an overview of the various parts of the criminal justice system. We will discuss the three main tenets of the criminal justice system – police, courts, and corrections – and the challenges faced by these institutions. We will also examine how individual, situational, environmental, and political forces shape these systems. We will evaluate policies implemented across the criminal justice system, paying special attention to the unintended consequences of these policies and the many difficulties that accompany policy implementation. By the end of the semester, you will be able to demonstrate a thorough understanding of the criminal justice system, identify strengths and weaknesses of American justice institutions, and brainstorm potential solutions for existing problems in the criminal justice process.

#### **Course Objectives**

- 1. To understand the historical foundation of the American criminal justice system.
- 2. To evaluate the balance of due process and crime control.
- 3. To understand criminological theories and their accompanying policy implications.
- 4. To identify strengths and weaknesses of existing criminal justice data.
- 5. To describe the role and interconnectedness of the three primary criminal justice branches (i.e., police, courts, corrections).
- 6. To understand the criminal justice process, from crime reporting to re-entry.
- 7. To identify a framework to evaluate the effectiveness of criminal justice policies.
- 8. To evaluate the immediate and distal implications of criminal justice policies.
- 9. To understand the challenges faced by criminal justice actors.
- 10. To identify discretionary decisions in the criminal justice process and the factors that influence these discretionary decisions (e.g., legal, extralegal, individual, situational, and community factors).

#### **Text & Materials**

The following textbook is required for this course: Peak, K. J., & Madensen, T. D. (2019). *Introduction to Criminal Justice: Practice and Process* (4<sup>th</sup> edition). Los Angeles, CA: Sage Publications Inc. Additional reading or materials will be posted on CANVAS.

#### **Attendance Policy**

Attendance will not be taken every class but it will be taken sporadically via in class assignments. These in class assignments will be graded as pass/fail. Advanced notice and documentation is required if you are to miss class for an excused purpose (e.g., conference travel, sports-related travel, religious holiday). Absences for illness, emergencies, or family-related matters must be communicated to the professor by email prior to the scheduled class time. #### **Course Assignments**

#### Exams

There will be four exams. All exams will be administered in person, in class. Exams will be a combination of (a) multiple choice and (b) short answer questions. The first three exams will only cover the material covered during that section of the class (i.e., foundations of criminal justice, police, courts). The final exam *will be comprehensive* (contain information from the entire semester; foundations of criminal justice, police, courts, and corrections). See the schedule below for exam dates (subject to change). If a student is unable to complete an exam on the scheduled date, they should contact the professor **at least** 24 hours in advance. Students who miss an exam without a formal excuse will receive a 0. The final exam will be administered on Thursday May 2<sup>nd</sup>, 2024 from 3:00pm to 5:00pm EST.

#### Weekly Quizzes

After class each Wednesday, there will be a quiz available on CANVAS. The quizzes will consist of both multiple choice and short answer questions based on the topics covered in class that week. The purpose of these weekly quizzes is two-fold: (1) engage you all in the material outside of the classroom setting and (2) help prepare you for the exams. On weeks where there is an exam, there will be no quiz. Quizzes will be due by Monday at 3:05 PM EST (the start of class) of the following week. Quizzes not turned in on time will receive a 0 and there will be no opportunity to make up missed weekly quizzes.

#### Liberal Studies Writing Assignment

The Liberal Studies Writing Assignment is a standard and mandatory assignment for all students taking CCJ2020 courses. For this assignment, you will be asked to respond to a given prompt. Assignments will be turned in on CANVAS and must be submitted on time. Late assignments or an assignment submitted via email/hard copy/etc. will not be accepted. Students will not be permitted to rewrite assignments after submission and/or grading. The prompt, requirements, and grading rubric will be provided in the first few weeks of the semester.

#### In-Class Assignments/Attendance

Attendance will be taken sporadically and unannounced throughout the semester via in-class assignments. These in class assignments will count for 10% of your final grade. Six in-class assignments will be collected throughout the semester to grade attendance. One in-class assignment will be dropped (i.e., you can miss one in-class assignment and still get the full 10% for attendance). Each assignment will be worth 2% of your final grade.

#### Extra Credit

There will be two opportunities for extra credit – available to all students. No extra credit opportunity will be specific to a student, please do not ask.
